cabochon (pronounced CAB-oh-shon) is a gemstone that is cut in the form of a smooth dome with a flat bottom in a round, oval, rectangle, or teardrop shape. Many opaque, translucent, and some transparent gems just love to be fashioned in this sleek, unfaceted cabochon form because it's often the best way to display their special beauty as well as their delightful candy colors.

Rich Chocolate. Brown Tourmaline comes in many sumptuous cocoa shades including deep, dark and milk chocolate and is beautiful in all kinds of jewelry. Chocolate brown Zircon and Topaz are two other delicious chocolate gems with great clarity and color depth.

Luscious Lemon. Lemon drops of smooth, silky lemon Quartz are popular gems for cabochoncut rings, pendants, necklaces, and earrings. Lemon colored Sapphire is another favorite that is both brilliant and durable.

Mellow Mint. Cool. green Jade and Malakite add a refreshing look to jewelry set with these popular cabochoncut gems. Both are beautifully opaque with a bright, glowing finish and are very affordable.

Sweet Pink Bonbon. Deliciously classic pink gems such as Spinel, Garnet, and Kunzite have a noticeably sweet glow when finished in cabochon style and mounted in karat gold or sterling silver jewelry.

How To Care For Enamel Jewelry

namel jewelry is famous for its rich array of brilliant opaque and transparent colors, some of which resemble bright and sparkling stained glass. There are two major enameling methods. Traditional "hot enamel" fuses powdered glass to gold, silver, or brass metal and is baked at extremely high temperature. With

contemporary "cold enamel" epoxy resin is applied to metal and baked at a much cooler temperature. Both methods produce similar looks.

Enamel jewelry can chip or crack if knocked against hard objects or dropped, so rings, bracelets, necklaces, cuff links, and pendants should always be handled carefully. Do not expose enamel jewelry

to harsh chemicals, abrasives, or household cleaners. Keep away from chlorine, ultrasonic and liquid jewelry cleaners. To clean, use warm soapy water and a soft brush. Store separately from other jewelry.

Only pure white diamond has the incomparable inner fire and rainbow sparkle possessed by no other gem. It is the hardest and

most durable substance known and is famous as the world's most popular gem for bridal jewelry. Diamond is also the age-old symbol of innocence and invincibility for those born in April.



Amethyst - Considered The Finest Variety Of Quartz

nthusiasts around the globe have long since considered Amethyst as the finest and most significant variety of the mineral quartz. Throughout history, rich purple Amethyst has been used in personal adornment and cherished by royalty and clergy alike. For hundreds of years, the rich and powerful have worn this gem as a symbol of rank. Even today, as an affordable gem, it has a rich and regal air to it.

The word Amethyst comes from the Greek word amethystos, which translates



to not drunken or intoxicated. The ancient Greeks and Romans believed Amethyst was a sobriety stone and was used to assist in getting rid of addictions. Interestingly, one of the greatest thinkers of all time, Leonardo Da Vinci, believed that amethyst could actually ward off evil thoughts and increase one's intelligence.

While traditional Amethyst ranges in color from a transparent, translucent lilac, to a deep, rich purple, it is also available in lovely green colors. The gemological name for green amethyst is "prasiolite".

What Is A Love Knot?

In medieval times, stylized golden knot pins were worn over the hearts of both men and women to show their eternal devotion. The knot's intertwined strands show no beginning or end, representing undying love.

What Are Paillons?

Pronounced "pay-ohns,"

these tiny ornaments are stamped from very thin sheets of gold and are used to decorate certain kinds of enamel jewelry. Paillons often take the form of delicate flowers, stars, or birds.

What Are Hearts And Arrows?

These light-reflection patterns are a visual phenomenon that can be seen in a perfectly cut round diamond, when examined through a special Hearts & Arrows viewing device. Hearts appear when the diamond is viewed through the pavilion or bottom. Arrows are shown when viewed through the table or top.
